- Entries taken on the day.
- Finishes should be no deeper than 12", otherwise penalties will be incurred.
- Ins and Outs will be taken into consideration.
- Entry fee: £10.00 in Classes 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.
- Start with horn sounding. Finish with horn sounding.
- The Committee reserves the right to put competitors in any class which appears to be suitable.
- All ploughmen to be on the ground at 9.30am.
- Ploughing commences at 10.00 am and finishes not later than 1.30 pm only last furrow left.
- Disqualification will follow if this rule is not observed.
- No person to cross the ground after ploughing has commenced.
- No assistance of any description to be given to the ploughmen. Veerings to be ploughed inwards, followed by three complete bouts, moving along the field towards the higher number.

- A maximum of three accessories allowed on the table for staging or decoration, but items which could be confused with those intended for judging must be clearly marked 'for display only'.

Judging by the show judges will be on a point system of up to 10 points for each item and up to 10 points for overall presentation.

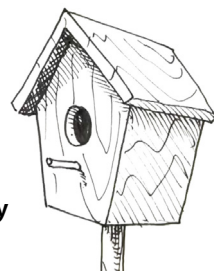

Glamorgan Honey Fruit Cake Recipe - For Class 73

Ingredients:

225g Self-raising flour	½ tsp. baking powder	pinch of salt
125g butter	225g honey	2 eggs
125g sultanas	125g raisins	50g candied peel
50g candied cherries	½ tsp. freshly ground nutmeg	
milk as required		

Method: Preheat oven to 175°C, gas mark 4, grease & line a 20cm round cake tin. Cream the butter and honey together. Add the eggs alternately, with flour, salt, baking powder and nutmeg. Add the dried fruits, peel and cherries, beat lightly to ensure ingredients bind well together. If the mixture is too stiff, add a little milk. Pour into the prepared cake tin and bake for 1¼ - 1½ hours until well risen and evenly browned. Remove from tin and cool on a wire rack. Display on a plate or board, protected with clear film.
